

*Eurospeak's **English for Specific Purposes: Law Enforcement** course is suitable for students interested in a career in the police. Eurospeak's **ESP Law Enforcement** gives students the language, information, and skills they will need for a career in law enforcement.*

A highly communicative course, Eurospeak's **ESP Law Enforcement** is designed to meet the English language needs of law enforcement personnel, from customs officers to gendarmes and police. It covers the full range of essential law enforcement situations including: vehicle identification, stop and search, crowd control and issuing statements. The course is vocabulary-rich and is aimed to help law enforcement personnel operate with ease in English in their daily jobs. It provides them with the skills to deal with situations in English and explain the consequences (legal or otherwise) of any action.

The course is available for students of level B1+.

Eurospeak's **ESP The Law Enforcement** comprises 120 hours of training (4 weeks) and allows students to:

- ✓ Learn the professional language they need to communicate effectively the law enforcement context.

On successful completion of the course, you will be awarded the Eurospeak **ESP The Law Enforcement** certificate.

Course Components

Language Development (60 hours – morning sessions)

Learners study the English language in a variety contexts and learn to use English with greater fluency, accuracy and confidence.

Module Objectives

- ✓ Improve the trainees' knowledge and understanding of the English Language.
- ✓ Develop their own reading, writing, speaking and listening skills.
- ✓ Develop their ability to use English in a variety of contexts.
- ✓ Allow them to become more fluent and confident in their use of English.

Module Content

Depending on the trainees' level of English. A1 to B2 options available.

Proficiency Objectives:

- ✓ B1 – Learners are able to enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life.
 - ✓ B2 – Learners are able to participate in standard interaction likely to be encountered in social, professional or academic life, identifying speakers' viewpoints and attitudes as well as the information content.
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English for Specific Purposes (60 hours – afternoon sessions)

Learners study the language and strategies they need to communicate effectively in law enforcement contexts.

Module Objectives

- ✓ Develop the vocabulary, language, and skills that students need to communicate effectively.
- ✓ Apply this knowledge to practical situations such as vehicle identification, stop and search, crowd control and issuing statements.

Module Content (B1+)**Unit 1: Law Enforcement**

- Time, uniform requirements, countries and nationalities, law enforcement around the world

Unit 2: Traffic and Vehicles

- Car parts, describing vehicles, documents

Unit 3: Out in the Community

- Describing a community, anti-social behaviour, community policing

Unit 4: Emergency Call

- Emergency calls, assault and injury, road traffic accident, domestic violence

Unit 5: Crimes Against Property

- Theft crimes, crime prevention, burglary, vehicle theft, crime prevention campaigns

Unit 6: Drugs and Alcohol

- Drugs legislation, drug related offences, drink and drug driving, drug related crime, customs control

Unit 7: Civil Disorder

- Civil disorder and riots, firearms and equipment, strikes and demonstrations, dealing with crowds, policing a football match

Unit 8: At the Station

- Police station layout, roles and responsibilities, rights in custody, ID procedures, interviewing suspects

Unit 9: Crime Scene Investigation

- Physical evidence, forensic techniques, E-fits, DNA testing

Unit 10: Criminal Justice Systems

- Penalties and punishments, legal systems, in court, extradition, Interpol notices

Unit 11: Organised Crime

- Organised crime groups, human trafficking, surveillance operations

Unit 12: International Co-operation

- Trans-national crime, cultural property crime, wildlife crime, intercultural competence
